PRIMER ON SUNNIS AND SHIITES

Who are these Shiites and Sunnis, and why do they hate each other? And why do they both hate the West? Who are Hamas and Fatah, and who are they supported by? Are the Saudis our allies? Should the US intercede, along with Iran in the ISIS war on Iraq? I am glad you asked all these questions, because I have strong opinions on the Mideast - also some facts.

The facts first:

The Sunnis and Shiites broke up over who should be Muhammad's successor. According to Pew Research, there are 1.6 billion Muslims in the world. 317 million are in the Middle East and there are 344 million in India and Pakistan. 85-90% of Muslims are Sunnis, and Iran, Iraq, Bahrain, and Azerbaijan, are the only nations with more Shiites than Sunnis. Lebanon has a significant Shia minority, estimated to be 45% of the total Muslim population. Indonesia has more Muslims than any other country, about 209 million.

It's a given that the Shiites and Sunnis are not going to suddenly love each other after 1400 years of conflict. There were several hundred years of relative peace under the Ottoman Empire, but the Ottomans started declining in the late 19th century; largely because the European powers were competing with each other for empire. One of the causes of WW 1 was that competition. Unfortunately for the Ottomans, they chose to be on the side of the Germans, and after the war, the Allies carved up the Empire with borders that in hindsight made no sense.

Before the Gulf War, Egypt, Syria, Iraq, had dictators who had to suppress descent to stay in power but they all had significant Christian minorities which were largely left alone. It's estimated that the three countries had 8-20% Christian populations.

In Iraq, Saddam Hussein was a secular Sunni ruling over a majority Shia country.

In Syria, Assad is a secular Alawite Shiite ruling a majority Sunni country in a civil war.

Mubarak was a secular Sunni ruling over a majority Sunni country.

In recent history, warring between Iraq and Iran, along with a peace treaty between Egypt and Israel, maintained a Mid Easy balance of power. When Bush removed Hussein from Iraq, and Obama helped depose Mubarak from Egypt, that balance was destroyed. The Shia majority took over Iraq, and the stage was set for the invasion of ISIS. Whole Christian communities have been destroyed in those three countries since.

Some terror organizations:

1. Al Qaida - Sunni, origins Saudi Arabia and Egypt

2. Hamas - Governing party of Palestine

3. al Fatah - Minority party in Palestine supported by Iran, formed by Yasser Arafat of the PLO.

4. Muslim Brotherhood - Originated in Egypt in the 1920's

5. ISIS - Islamist State of Iraq and al Sham - Aim to form a new Caliphate across the Middle East and eventually the world.

6. Taliban - Fought against the Russians, and took over most of Afghanistan after the Russians left. Harbored Osama bin Laden.

They are all Sunnis, but it has been widely reported that al Fatah has received some funding from Iran. Our "allies" the Saudis have given financial support to several of them. The Saudis and all the Gulf States fear Iran possessing nuclear weapons.

The only people that Shiites and Sunnis hate worse than each other is us, and to a lesser degree all the West. They want to destroy us!

Opinion:

We have made mostly wrong decisions in our Mid East foreign policy, and it would be folly to help either side in Iraq. They both hate us, and imagine if Germany and Japan had declared war on each other during WW11, after we were at war with both, and we decided to help either. We helped the Taliban run the Russians out of Afghanistan. How has that worked out? Muslims killing each other will save American lives. The enemy of our enemy is not our friend!

To rebuild we must:

1. Congress must stop Obama from making and breaking laws. He should be impeached. Our recovery could start two years earlier with him out office.
